For Hindus and Buddhists

On my honour, I promise that I will do my best

to do my duty to my Dharma and to the Queen, to help other people and to keep the Scout Law.


For humanists, atheists and those with no defined faith

On my honour, I promise that I will do my best to uphold our Scout values, to do my duty to the Queen, to help other people and to keep the Scout Law.

For subjects of independent commonwealth and foreign countries, the following wording can replace 'duty to the Queen'


Scouts learn skills that are essential to building their character, helping others and developing an awareness of the world around them.
